Christmas Traditions

When Christmas time begins in Germany many children have an Advent calendar. From the 1st of December till the 24th of December the children open one door and behind each door they find chocolates or little toys. On the 5th of December the children put one of their shoes in front of the front door, because on the next day is "Nikolaus" day. In the morning of the 6th December the children look into their shoes and find sweet toys and different things. Christmas time has four Sundays. On every Sunday people in Germany light a candle on the Advent wreath. So they shorten the waiting time till Christmas. The people often put red candles on the Advent wreath. A short time before Christmas Eve they buy a fir tree and decorate it with fairy lights, tinsel, and so on. In the evening of the 24th December the people celebrate Christmas. Under the fir tree there are many wonderful presents for everyone. Santa Claus has brought them. But the parents bring the presents. Many families eat a goose in that evening. The Christmas Goose.

The food in Germany

Here in Germany the food is very traditional. For example, "Knödel mit Rotkohl". That's smooth balls made of potatoes and water. "Rotkohl" is a purple cabbage.

The older people often have their own gardens and harvest their own vegetables.
